FALL 2020 Requirements

The curriculum in the political science major is flexible and allows students to move through the coursework in many ways. This four-year plan illustrates one possible path a new freshman could take to complete a degree in four years. This is not an official document and is not the only way that a political science degree can be completed in four years. Current students should refer to their individual Academic Advising Report for specific graduation requirements.

Notes: By completing the requirements of the Political Science Legal Studies major, you will also earn the paralegal certificate. This is an additional credential that is posted to your transcript at graduation.

Notes: The Political Science 493 Internship can be completed for 1-12 credits and while listed in the fourth year on this plan, can also be completed in the third year or during a summer session. Students must arrange an internship through the department internship coordinator and enroll for credit. An internship is an experiential learning opportunity that provides students with hands-on experience in a potential career field, supervision and coaching from prospective employers, and the ability to learn professional norms and behaviors. In addition, completing an internship allows students to differentiate themselves in a competitive job market. Students should begin planning for an internship by the beginning of the junior year and can complete the internship in the junior or senior year.

Opportunities: Students who move efficiently through the coursework in this major could add a minor or certificate without extending time to degree. The College of Letters and Sciences offers 14 certificates to include Diversity Leadership, Applied Research, Professional Writing and Publishing, and Web Site Development and Administration. Completion of a certificate enables you to acquire additional tools for your toolbox by focusing on a specific skill that will complement your degree program and deepen knowledge in an area that is desirable to future employers.

Notes: All students must earn 120 credits to earn a bachelor's degree and all requirements in this program can be completed in fewer than 120 credits. Most students have the opportunity to choose additional courses in the fourth year to expand skills, explore interests, or try something new. **Opportunities:** LSINDP 399: Career Information in Letters and Sciences is a 1-credit course that focuses on career and graduate school opportunities; identifying skills, strengths, and work values; creating effective job search materials; developing a networking strategy; and planning for a successful post-graduation transition.
