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This transfer guide is designed to assist students with their academic planning. Students should contact the member institution to keep informed of changes, as final responsibility for verifying information rests with the student.

### Transfer Options

- **Completed Associate of Art or Associate of Science degree:** Students who have completed an Associate of Art or Associate of Science degree from Madison College will meet the UW-Whitewater general education requirements. The Associate of Art or Associate of Science does **not** waive the **U.S. Racial/ Ethnic Diversity** course requirement. Students may complete the U.S. Racial/Ethnic Diversity course after transferring to UW-Whitewater.
- Associate of Applied Science does not waive General Education requirements at UW-Whitewater
- **Completing some courses at Madison College:** Students will follow UW-Whitewater’s general education requirements to meet the general education component of the baccalaureate degree.

Priority Deadlines:

- Fall: July 1<sup>st</sup>
- Spring: December 1<sup>st</sup>

Students are encouraged to apply at least one semester prior to intended start term at UW-Whitewater

### **Admission Requirements**

- 2.00/4.00 GPA on a minimum of twelve transferable credits, using UWW Repeat Policy.
- Students who do not have twelve transferable credits will be reviewed based on new freshman criteria.
- The maximum number of semester hours applied to degree from a community college is 72.
- Business, Education and other majors at UWW may have higher GPA requirements for acceptance into the major: [www.uww.edu/admissions/transfer](http://www.uww.edu/admissions/transfer)

### **Calculation of Admission GPA**

Grades from all transferable coursework will be used. Developmental transferrable coursework in English and Math are included. A repeated course grade will be used but only if the original grade is C- or lower. Please see the [UWW Repeat Policy](#) for more information regarding repeated courses.

### **World Language Requirement**

World language is only required for students pursuing a Bachelor of Arts within the College of Letters and Sciences. Students that have completed at least 1 year of the same world language from Madison College have met this requirement. Only college level world language is considered to fulfill this requirement.

### **Scholarships**

Student's application for admission also serves as the scholarship application. Students must be admitted by April 1st to be considered for scholarships for the next fall semester start. Scholarship consideration is based on transfer GPA and credit amounts.

## University of Wisconsin - Whitewater Transfer Planning Guide – General Education

### General Education Information

Students transferring **with** the Associate of Arts or Associate of Sciences Degree:

- University-wide general education requirements as well as all CORE requirements below are satisfied with completion of an Associate of Arts or Associate of Sciences degree from Madison College with the exception of the U.S. Racial/Ethnic Diversity requirement.
- Students may complete the U.S. Racial/Ethnic Diversity course after transferring to UW-Whitewater. Madison College equivalent for the U.S. Racial/Ethnic Diversity course requirement are identified as **DV** in the Appendix.

Students transferring **without** the Associate of Arts or Associate of Sciences Degree:

- **Applied Associate degrees do not waive students from general education requirements.**
- Students who do not earn the Associate of Arts or Associate of Sciences degree before transferring will have their coursework evaluated on a course-by-course basis and may need to complete courses at UW-Whitewater if missing categories below
- Some majors require courses that serve as both degree requirements and satisfy General Education, especially in Business and Education majors. Please reach out to UW-Whitewater Transfer Admissions for more information

CORE classes:

- UW-Whitewater General Education requires students to take four of five multi-disciplinary courses: CORE 110; CORE 130; (CORE 120\* or 140); and CORE 390. Based on number of credits transferred, students may satisfy some of the CORE requirements with substitute courses as follows:
  - 20 credits or fewer: Students must complete all four CORE requirements.
  - 21-39 credits: Students must complete CORE 390 and one additional CORE course as assigned. The two remaining CORE requirements can be satisfied with GA, GE, GG, GH, and/or GS courses, as appropriate.
  - 40 credits or more: Students must complete CORE 390. The three remaining CORE requirements can be satisfied with appropriate GA, GE, GG, GH, and/or GS courses.
- CORE 390 is a class unique to UW-Whitewater and must be taken at UW-Whitewater.

\* Madison College's 803-225 (20<sup>th</sup> Century World History) will transfer as CORE 120.
