A Q&A with Chancellor King

On March 1, Corey A. King became the 18th chancellor of UW-Whitewater.

Why did you choose UW-Whitewater?

I came here because of the commitment to student success, inclusivity and access to higher education. UW-Whitewater is known for its academic excellence and distinction, and as an economic engine for the region.

What have you learned about UW-Whitewater and its people that you didn't know before?

You don't have to convince people that this institution is great. They know it. They feel it. They believe it. For me, the greatest focus is to harness all that energy and provide direction.

What are your priorities for your first 120 days?

In addition to launching our new strategic plan, I'm focused on enrollment growth and financial stability, shared governance, investing in the Rock County campus, reimagining our inclusivity, diversity and equity efforts, and engaging with students, faculty, staff, alumni and the broader community.

Is it true that on your interview day, you visited Perkins Stadium during a student-led tour and were inspired to sprint across the field?

Yes! (laughs) I used to play football and it's been a while since I've been on a campus with a football team. When we arrived at the stadium in a golf cart, I asked Will Hinz (student body president) if I could run on the turf. He said, 'Sure!' I jumped off the golf cart and took off to the 50-yard line. It was an incredible feeling. I can't wait for the Warhawks' home opener on Sept. 9.

Has purple completely taken over your wardrobe?

Yes, yes and yes! I now have purple sunglasses, ties, shirts, socks, coffee cup mug, flowers, everything.

What were you like as a college student?

People might say I was boring. I didn't go to college with the intention to have fun, grow and develop as a person. I went with the intention of paving the way for others — very focused on my studies. I was an engaged student leader, an RA, orientation leader and student government member.

How was your own university experience transformational?

Academically, I knew that I would be challenged, and I would get a degree in a discipline. I didn't realize there was a leader inside of me waiting to come out. Because of my experiences in college, I received a "degree in life," becoming a responsible community member and servant leader.

What should alumni know about current students?

They are engaged. Passionate about what they believe in. There's both a desire to learn and a desire to serve. Many of our current students are first generation, and they come from multiple diverse communities.

What can alumni do to stay engaged and support our students?

Find a way to contribute – financially or with your time. It was important to me when I graduated that I donated what I could afford to my alma mater. I was giving 50 dollars a month. It was something I could do to pay it forward. For those with the ability to mentor current students – reach out to the UW-Whitewater program of your discipline.

Our students would greatly benefit from your mentorship and advice. Reach back and pull people forward with you.

What do you like to do for fun?

I love to bake, exercise, play golf and watch a good action or thriller movie.

Anything else you'd like us to know?

To be in the chancellor's office is surreal. To work for a university that has transcended to become a family is beyond my wildest dreams. It's not "work" anymore. I love doing what I do now. It's a way of life.

Warhawks help with qualified charitable distributions—QCD

HOW IT WORKS



You must be 70 and a half or older to make a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) from your IRA to a public charity like UW-Whitewater Foundation, Inc. That is also the age when you must begin taking distributions.



You can make a QCD of up to \$100,000 directly from your IRA to UW-Whitewater Foundation, Inc., and it will be excluded from your taxable income.



Contact your IRA custodian and tell them to make a QCD gift to UW-Whitewater Foundation, Inc. Then tell us what fund or funds you want to support with your gift.



Your gift must be completed by Dec. 31 to earn the tax benefit in that year.

BENEFITS TO YOU



Your gift can be used to satisfy all or part of the required minimum distribution (RMD) you must take from your IRA.



Your gift will reduce your taxable income, even if you do not itemize deductions.



Your gift will go into the fund(s) that you choose, where it will work to support our mission: A better UW-Whitewater.

Wisconsin's largest business school welcomes a new dean



Dr. Paul Ambrose was named dean of the College of Business and Economics at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater in January 2023.

Since 2005, Dr. Ambrose has been part of the UW-Whitewater community, serving in multiple roles, from faculty member to department chair to associate dean, and most recently as interim dean.

“Dr. Ambrose brings a wealth of knowledge and expertise to the position with ideas about how to meet the needs of a broader group of students,” said Robin Fox, then interim provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. “He has already begun work on multiple articulation agreements with the technical colleges and has been a leader in discussions about retaining students from underrepresented groups. Under his leadership, I believe the college — Wisconsin’s largest accredited school of business — will not only continue its high-quality programs, but there will be an expansion in the students served in our region and online.”

What can we expect to see from the College of Business and Economics under Dean Ambrose?

Dr. Ambrose is committed to an ever-developing, inclusive, world-class college dedicated to creating future executives who lead through ESG – a focus on the Environment, Social ramifications, and Governance. Dr. Ambrose states:

“The more we develop our students to look at the decisions that they could be making in the future—how their decisions impact the environment, affect society, and how they organize their systems and organizations—is key. The goal is to ensure that we are good stewards of work, the environment, and people. This is how we put education into practice. We see it as an opportunity, an obligation, to transform students and to transform the future.”

Founders Day honors 2023 award winners

“All of these accomplished individuals speak to the breadth and the depth of the impacts that our graduates can have, both professionally and in their communities,” said Chancellor Corey A. King. “As evidenced by these individuals, our academic programs have a strong track record of producing talented, versatile graduates, and I couldn’t be more proud to recognize and celebrate the achievements of these Warhawks.”



This year’s recipient of the Outstanding Recent Alumni Award is **Henry Schwartz**. The award recognizes the professional accomplishments of Schwartz, who earned a B.B.A. in entrepreneurship and a B.A. in Spanish in 2011 and co-founded MobCraft Beer that same year. Schwartz continues to lead that company, which is expanding to its fourth brick-and-mortar location and generates \$4.5 million in annual sales, with a team that includes several fellow Warhawks.



Byron “Chris” Chrisman and **Carlene Chrisman** are this year’s recipients of the Distinguished Alumni Award for Service to UW-Whitewater. After earning a B.S. in business administration with an emphasis on accounting in 1959, Chris Chrisman embarked on a career spanning tax law, commercial real estate development and diverse businesses. The Chrismans funded the Mary Poppe Chrisman Success Center with an initial gift of \$1.5 million in 2016, and a subsequent estate gift in 2019 of \$5 million—the largest gift to date in the university’s history—targeted four endowment funds: Student Success Fund, Warhawk Emergency Fund, Wheelchair Athletics and Rugby.



The recipient of the Distinguished Alumni Award for Professional Achievement is **Monica Kelsey-Brown**. Kelsey-Brown, who earned a B.S.E. in elementary education in 1990 and an M.S. in curriculum and instruction in 1992. She is the first superintendent of color in the School District of Brown Deer, a district of 1,600 students that is one of the most diverse in the state. Kelsey-Brown took the helm in July 2020, in the early days of COVID-19, after working in various roles at Milwaukee Public Schools since 2002.



Also receiving the Distinguished Alumni Award for Professional Achievement is **Ed Steckley**. Steckley, who earned a B.A. in graphic design and a minor in art history in 2018 after an initial stint on campus in the early 1990s, is an award-winning freelance illustrator whose work has appeared on “Saturday Night Live,” in MAD Magazine, and in children’s books — including the “Rube Goldberg” series — as well as in magazines, newspapers and a range of advertising campaigns.



The recipient of the S.A. White for Contributions to UW-Whitewater is **Therese Kennedy**. Kennedy has worked at the Office of Recreation Sports and Facilities for more than 30 years, serving as director since August 2020, and has left an indelible imprint on the campus and the community as a member of the Athletics Hall of Fame Board, a board member of the Tip Off Club and Quarterback Club, mentoring scores of students, and working on behalf of Wally and Rod’s Warhawk Raffle. She also serves as co-president of the Whitewater Community Foundation.
