Full Circle Opportunity for Community Based Learning Graduate

Once a student in a service-learning program, now a teacher and mentor in a classroom of his own.

When Kolden Severson ('23) was a student at UW-Whitewater, one of his most impactful learning experiences was participating in the <u>Community Based Learning</u> (CBL) program. As



an elementary education major, Spanish education minor, CBL gave Severson the opportunity to learn in a 3rd grade classroom at Washington Elementary School in Whitewater. While there, he was able to observe in-service teachers, and have a safe environment to grow and improve his own Spanish language skills. He made meaningful personal connections with students and families in the community, and professional networks with teachers

throughout the school. "I gained a greater connection with the community in Whitewater," Severson says. By working with students directly in my community, I felt better connected and a part of the community, and not just a person attending college here."

His experience and connections helped Severson get hired before graduation at Washington Elementary. Now with a 3rd grade classroom of his own, he mentors CBL students in the Spanish for Educators course. "As a teacher, I have a million things on my mind all day," he says, "but when I have a CBL student I know that at least my Spanish speaking student is getting support and I can focus on other students. He notes that "CBL students have helped my newcomer students produce high quality work, and be further included in the class."

Severson values the connections he is able to make as a teacher-mentor to 3rd graders and UWW students. "My whole class loves CBL students! They are excited when they come for the day and say goodbye when they leave," he says. "I think it is so important to give kids role models more time to interact with other community members."

Free public lectures offered in Whitewater and Janesville.



For more than 50 years, UW-Whitewater has hosted summer camps for youth. Each year, thousands of kids gather on the Whitewater and Janesville campuses, leaving devices behind to engage with each other in the magic of camp. This summer, nearly 70 camps are scheduled, offering opportunities for everyone to learn and play the Warhawk Way!

After a record-setting camps season in 2023, <u>Continuing</u> <u>Education Services</u> is prepared to host even more budding athletes, musicians, artists, gamers, and active learners this summer. New offerings this season include Sports Performance Camp, College for Teens, and Wrestling programs. At the Rock County campus, Volleyball Day Camp and <u>Musical Theatre Magic</u> will make their debuts. For those over 18 looking for a camps experience of their own, Adult <u>Pickleball</u> will be offered in June. And making its highly-anticipated post-COVID return is <u>Flute Camp</u> in July.

Inclusivity and belonging are part of the priority mission of UW-Whitewater. Summer camps put the mission into practice by providing events like <u>Wheelchair Basketball camp</u>, hosted by national champion teams, and <u>Chatter Matters</u>, a camp serving individuals who use assistive communication devices and their families. In addition, UWW maintains a 1:10 ratio of camp staff to camper for all youth programming and prides itself in <u>youth</u>. <u>protection training</u> for all faculty, staff, coaches, and volunteers involved in leading programming. Over 500 staff and volunteers are hired, representing a wide range of backgrounds and areas of expertise.



"We are proud the reputation we have built for exceptional programming," says Morgan Anderson, director of camps and conferences. "Often youth start with a commuter or day camp to learn the ins and outs or attend with a friend or teammate. Most return summer after summer to experience college life," Anderson shares. Families have many options to fill their summer breaks, and UWW camps should be on the top of the list. "When you choose a summer experience for the youth in your life, we understand the weight of that decision. Safety is our top priority, followed closely by skill development and lots of FUN!"
