Early Childhood Conference Returns to Campus

Educators and practitioners will convene in Whitewater next month.

Now in its 46th year, the UW-Whitewater <u>Early Childhood Conference</u> (ECC) is scheduled for April 5-6, and will be held fully in-person for the first time since 2019. The theme for this year's conference is "Building for the Future."

The ECC is a high-quality professional development program for students, researchers and practitioners with opportunities to gather, learn, network, and collaborate. Thanks to the generous sponsorship from the <u>Wisconsin Early Childhood Association</u> and <u>Educators Credit Union</u>, the ECC continues to be an affordable way to gain knowledge and develop skills.

This year's keynote speaker is Holly Elissa Bruno. Bruno, a best-selling and award winning author, will discuss redefining genius and discovering everyone's unique originality, and how it can build a better future. Additional breakout session topics include resilience in

social media, understanding inclusion, and music, art, literature and STEM in the early childhood classroom. Breakout session presenters are practitioners in PK-12 school districts, universities, consulting groups and other youth-serving organizations.

Summer camps are a vital part of UW-Whitewater's history. For more than 50 years, <u>Continuing Education Services</u> (CES) has offered athletic, arts, academic and enrichment programs for youth. Campus comes to life in summer with thousands of

campers, learning new skills and developing their talents. Parents know their child will make friends and memories, but how do they know they will be safe?

In spring 2023, the Universities of Wisconsin established a Youth Protection and Compliance Policy to ensure the safety of youth participants in activities on all campuses. Since then, UW-Whitewater has onboarded more than 670 employees and volunteers with nearly 1,500 trainings and 600 background checks. Trainings focus on illness and injury, severe weather events, emergency situation, medication and dietary restrictions, communication channels, and youth mental health.

CES takes great pride in establishing and maintaining an environment in which every camper will thrive and have a memorable experience. Parents and guardians can feel confident that no matter what camp their child enrolls in, they will be safe and cared for while on our campus.





Student Spotlight: Lindsay Plummer




News and Upcoming Events:
