### Announcing New Partnership with Tribal College

Thanks to a new articulation agreement between UW-Whitewater and Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwa Community College (LCOOCC) in Hayward, more students will be on the path to completing a teaching degree. The agreement allows students to enroll more easily in the UW-Whitewater ECE4U program towards a bachelor's degree in Early Childhood Education for dual licensure in early childhood education and early childhood special education. It ensures that credits taken at LCOOCC seamlessly transfer to UW-Whitewater. The program clarifies and widens the path for students seeking a bachelor's degree, and offers significant economic and professional advantages.

UW-Whitewater received \$50,000 in grants from the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families to fund this innovative program,

which combines early childhood education and special education classes and opportunities for licensure. Funding through the grant will allow for the creation of a hybrid ECE4U online program to more closely meet the needs of students in the LCO Ojibwa community.

"Most Lac Courte Oreilles students have strong local ties and simply cannot move to southern Wisconsin to earn their bachelor's degree," said Anne Tillett, ECE4U program coordinator. "Many students are working and can't leave their jobs, or they have families to support. So, we decided to bring the program to them via hybrid delivery." This collaborative work has the potential to impact two seemingly different communities in powerful ways.

#### **Free Financial Planning for Student Veterans**

A new program designed for student veterans will provide one-on-one financial planning to help alleviate the stress of money management that many people face. This program will help create a plan for veterans' future finances through looking at their current finances and predicting the most beneficial plan for them. Initially, the program will be available for UW-Whitewater student veterans, with plans to expand the program to local veterans and service members in the future.



Typically financial planning costs \$500-\$5,000, but

thanks to a grant, the planning in this program will be offered to student veterans for free. All of the

financial planners, including some UW-W alumni, will be volunteers.

Garrett Smith (Finance and Business Law), indicates that it is important for student veterans to have access to this kind of financial planning. "Getting assistance now will get the information to avoid bigger mistakes," Smith says. Financial planning will help prepare for debt management because saving a little money now can help in the future.
