Alum Strengthens Partnership with his Alma Mater

When Brian Robinson came to the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater in 2001, his plan was to run track and major in marketing. A leg injury and a volunteer program led him in a very different direction. And now, his career has come full circle.

Robinson, is the director of leisure and transportation services at <u>Fairhaven Senior Services</u>, one of UW-Whitewater's most dedicated community partners. When he first came to Whitewater over twenty years ago, his future goals didn't include working in the community with seniors. As an undergrad, a friend introduced him to the Nursing Home Visitation program, a volunteer service opportunity for students spearheaded by Dr. Cliff O'Beirne (Psychology). Robinson enjoyed the experience so much, he volunteered all of his four years on campus.



Ultimately, Robinson graduated in 2005 with a degree in Public Policy and Administration, with a minor in Recreation and Leisure studies. He had worked in local Parks and Recs programs with youth throughout high school and college, and even with a rewarding experience with senior citizens in college, he never thought he would end up working in a senior living community. After

returning home to the Wausau area and a couple jobs in southern Wisconsin, Robinson returned to Whitewater in 2014 to work at Fairhaven.

In his role of director of leisure services, Brian is responsible for developing programs to keep residents at Fairhaven mentally, physically and socially active. Like many other senior living facilities, Fairhaven offers bingo, movies, and book groups. But under Robinson's leadership, many new and innovative programs have been offered for residents. Robinson partners with many athletic teams to visit Fairhaven and for residents to attend UW-W athletics events. In addition, UW-W student organizations lead games and events for residents. Since 2015, Robinson, residents and student groups have been making dog treats which are donated to local shelters. He brought the Cycling Without Age program to Fairhaven, where over 200 bike rides are given annually to residents by Robinson and volunteers.



But, enriching the lives of seniors isn't the only benefit of the partnerships Robinson has cultivated between Fairhaven and UW-W. Faculty from Kinesiology, Sociology, and Social Work have worked on student projects at Fairhaven, and many students have completed internships and volunteer programs with Robinson and others. Jeannine Rowe (Social Work) offers a 3-credit class onsite for people interested in the aging and gerontology field and students in the Communication Sciences and Disorders program are learning about speech and aging from residents.

When asked whether students should consider careers in working with seniors and older adults, Robinson enthusiastically replied "absolutely! It is very fulfilling field and caring for the well-being of others is so important." He values all of the partnerships he has made with UW-W faculty, staff, students, teams and organizations, but is always open to new ideas. "Give me a call or come visit us at Fairhaven, and let's make something happen!"

Searching for Earth's Secrets

Graduate student helps to bring traveling science museum exhibit to campus to share with university and PK-12 students.

In the spring of 2023, the Joint Oceanographic Institutions for Deep Earth Sampling (JOIDES) Expedition 399 will sail to the Lost City Hydrothermal Field and Sarah Treadwell, a graduate student in the Department of Communication, will be on board. As part of her outreach, Treadwell is helping to bring a traveling science museum exhibit called "In Search of Earth's Secrets" to campus. This interactive, educational exhibit is an outreach project that is a part of the International Ocean Discovery Project featuring the work of the JOIDES Resolution – a core drilling research ship funded by the National Science Foundation. Research collected by the ship impacts our understanding of climate change, the origin of life and plate tectonics, among other topics.





Treadwell has been working with Corey Davis, professor and graduate program coordinator on the project, slated to arrive on campus next month. "This exhibit will highlight the incredible amount of career and field research opportunities there are in science to students of all ages," Treadwell notes. "It will also give university students a chance to practice their science

communication skills as docent volunteers." Local elementary, middle and high schools will be invited to view the exhibit, which will be free and open to the public.



"In Search of Earth's Secrets" will be on display at the Community Engagement Center from December 12 to February 28, with portions tentatively scheduled to be displayed on the main campus. A Warm Welcome to New Staff Members


The <u>School of Graduate Studies</u> and <u>Continuing Education</u> is pleased to welcome several new staff members to our team.
