It's 2024. Is gender equity still an issue? Negotiations Workshop: November

57% of men attempt to renegotiate their first job offer. Only 7% of women do the same. Why? Research shows that one reason is that women lack confidence in the hiring process. This reluctance is considered a significant contributor to the gender pay gap.

To help students with this crucial step in the hiring process, in November '23, WIBI partnered with the student Financial Management Association (FMA) to host a panel discussion featuring UWW Alumni and experts.
