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RecycleMania Update

RecycleMania is now beginning its eighth and final week so it is important for everyone to keep going strong with their sustainable habits. The theme for this final week is electronics, light bulbs and batteries.

Scoring Methodology

Waste Minimization Scoring: The complex that is ranked highest (lowest amount of total waste per resident) is given five points, the second highest four points, and so on to one point. The lowest ranked complexes will receive zero points in this category.

Recycling Scoring: Complexes are ranked in order of the recycling percentage calculated from highest to lowest (the highest with the largest proportion of their waste being recycled and the lowest with the smallest proportion of their waste being recycled).



The table to the left shows the combined scoring for each building based on the waste minimization and recycling scoring. As you can see, Fricker is in first place with 20 points and Fischer and Clem are tied for 2nd place with 19 points. How to Recycle Electronics

Electronics contain harmful materials such as Lead, Mercury, Cadmium and BFRs (Brominated Flame Retardants). Here are instructions on how to properly recycle electronics so that the handling of these chemicals are handled properly

- A collection bin for cell phones, rechargeable batteries, printer cartridges, and CD/DVD media located next to the Information Desk in the University Center
- Various companies also offer electronic buyback options. Companies who will take back electronics include: Apple, Canon, Dell, HP, LG, Samsun and Sony
- BestBuy and Staples also accept most electronics and large appliances
