

Qualified Treatment Trainees Grants Program

Overview - What is the QTT Grants Program?

The Wisconsin QTT Grants Program is an investment in workforce development and system improvement by Department of Health Services (DHS) to address the workforce shortage of behavioral health professionals. The program scope of work is to increase the number of behavioral health professionals available to provide services by awarding grants to agencies to increase the number of QTTs providing services in the agency's DHS 35 outpatient mental health clinics and to invest in statewide QTT supervisor development. A QTT requires both direct practice experience and supervision to fulfill requirements for the credentialing process. The QTT Grants Program increases access to required employment experience and the supervision necessary during this process by expanding financial and supervisory support at qualified agencies. In Fiscal Year 2023, the program's scope of work will address diversity, equity, and inclusion barriers by awarding grants to unpaid or underpaid QTTs and grants to agencies to address underserved communities. This scope also includes engagement in system improvement through work to increase the availability of professionals with education in providing dual diagnoses services and addressing barriers for students to leverage an associate human services degree to complete a Bachelor of Social Work degree.

State Fiscal Year 2023 Expanding Agency Award funding flow chart by Expanding award type and state regions.




Emerging	Grants to agencies that do not currently hire and supervise post-graduate QTT to begin hiring and supervising post-graduate QTTs.
Culturally Responsive Emerging Agency	The purpose of this program is to address unique barriers to accessing culturally responsive treatment services by supporting BIPOC-serving agencies to increase their capacity to serve racially diverse, unand underinsured/Medicaid patients, and communities in shortage areas, including by hiring a QTT.
Supplemental Accommodations	The purpose of this program is to provide support to agencies in hiring and internally supervising QTTs with a communications-related need for accommodations, such as a QTT who is Deaf or Hard of Hearing.
Expanding	The purpose of this program is to assist grantee agencies that currently support graduate QTTs to hire one additional QTT. A QTT supervisor from each grantee agency also participates in the QTT supervisor training initiative (a one-day workshop and monthly community of practice). Grants are split evenly between adult and youth program support.
QTT Stipend	This program awards stipends to QTTs who are unpaid or underpaid by employing agencies in order to promote retention until certification.
Post Masters Dual-Diagnosis Certificate	The purpose of this program is to develop and offer a post-masters certificate (providing greater depth into dual-diagnosis treatment than can be offered in standard graduate education due to accreditation requirements) for treating people with dual diagnoses of mental health and substance use disorder.
Improved Pathways to BSW	This grant funds developing and partnering with regional technical colleges and 2-year UW campuses to align "human service associate programs" and create a pathway to Bachelors of Social Work degree.



Dual Diagnosis - Focus on co-occurring mental health and substance use treatment

Training Title: Integrative Strategies for Treating Co-Occurring Disorders

UW-Whitewater CITEE is developing an online, post-graduate professional development course for new, as well as more experienced therapists, to enhance their understanding of the key issues involved in assessing and treating clients with co-occurring issues. We are creating an easy-to-follow framework model based on best practices with co-occurring disorders. This training program will not only tackle the basics of co-occurring disorders, but also provide an assessment tool/framework to better assess co-occurring disorders and client risk and apply practical implementation of treatment approaches. This innovative and highly engaging training will feature multi-modal learning, short videos, gamification, quizzes and short case studies.

The American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) Criteria is used for assessment, service planning, placement, and continued stay and discharge of individuals with addictive disorders. During Summer 2022, UW-Whitewater's graduate social work department integrated a 6 hour, online training into the substance use disorders treatment course. This training will be offered again Summer 2023 for the next cohort of graduate students, and hopefully to other graduate and post-graduate professionals across Wisconsin. The ability to assess substance use disorders is a critical component of the diagnosis and treatment of co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders. It will be integrated in a different manner in the final post-graduate course.


